at Cranbourne we can decide on which walks we wish to do either as individuals or as a group. RBGC is located at the Corner Ballarto Road and Botanic Drive, Cranbourne, (off South Gippsland Highway) Melway Ref: 133 K10. The turnoff for the Gardens is signed and located 500m past the Cranbourne Racecourse.

### Royal Botanic Gardens Cranbourne have provided the following information:

- The entry into the Australian Garden is Free. The Gardens are open 7 days a week from 9 am to 5 pm.
- The Garden Explorer costs for a daily ticket are \$7.50 per adult and \$6.00 per concession / child. Tickets may be purchased from the Visitor Centre using either cash or EFTPOS. The Garden Explorer commences at 10 am and concludes at 4 pm and is a hop on hop off service to allow you to travel around the gardens. The Garden Explorer seats a maximum of 23 people and cannot be booked in advance.
- Public Tour costs are \$6.70 per person and \$5.70 concession / child. These guided tours are one hour walking tours around the Australian Garden.
- Group tours available upon request at either 11.00 am or 2.00 pm and costs are \$5.70 for a group of 10 or more.
- Tour 1: Plants for Your Place (790 metres in length) 11.00 am daily Join our experienced guide on a journey from the Red Centre to the Eastern Seaboard, picking up expert tips and tricks to help you find the best Aussie plants for your place. This tour commences from the base of the Visitor Centre and concludes at the Kiosk.
- Tour 2: Flora Australis (835 metres in length) 2.00 pm daily—Discover how Australian plants have evolved and adapted over millions of years and how human interaction with plants has changed over time. This tour commences from the Kiosk in the Australian Garden and concludes at the Visitor Centre.
- Guided Tour Double Pass costs \$8.80 per person Plants for Your Place & Flora Australis At 11.00 am, take the Plants for Your Place tour and at 2.00 pm, take the Flora Australis tour.
- Guided Tour including Garden Explorer Pass \$10.00 per person—Take either tour Plants for Your Place or Flora Australis and enjoy a daily pass on the Garden Explorer.
- You can enjoy a coffee or a light snack or lunch at the Boon Wurrung Café. The café can be busy at peak times, so we advise you to book ahead on 5990 2247.
- There are wooden garden bench seats scattered all around the Australian Garden, as well as many metal chairs for your comfort.
- The Stringybark Picnic Area, located at the end of Stringybark Drive and a mere 50 metres from the parking lot, offers BBQ's and seating under the shade of trees. Please note the BBQ's are not able to be booked.
- The Woodland Picnic Area, located 600 metres from the Visitor Centre, offers undercover BBQ's and seating as well as a large playground and grassy area. Please note that BBQ's are not able to be booked.



### August Meeting Report

### **Elyse Kelly Mitchell Shire Council Environment Department Coordinator**

At our August meeting, Elyse Kelly the Environmental Programs Coordinator at Mitchell Shire Council gave a presentation on its Environment Strategy 2014-2024which was adopted by Council on July 30 2014. She gave an overview of the development and features of the strategy. It is a 10 year strategy with annual action plans with a 10 year strategy Council is able to take a longer term view. The Strategy builds on the first Mitchell Shire Environment Strategy which was developed in house and adopted by Council in May 2000. The strategy was first reviewed and adopted in April 2005; this review determined that it will be comprehensively reviewed every three years. The second review was conducted in July 2008 and was due for review in 2011. The purpose of the review of the Strategy is to build on past achievements, identify opportunity to increase protection of the natural environment, focus on natural landscape features and priorities for action, to integrate sound environmental management into all aspects of Council business, highlight the significance and role of Council in a broad range of legislative responsibility and support community participation and leadership – in land stewardship and biodiversity conservation.



She broadly presented the consultation stage, response to submissions, the Strategy implementation cycle and policy implications.

A survey was conducted of 300 residents/ratepayers an online community survey with three community workshops. Workshops were held with agency stakeholders, the Mitchell Environment Advisory Committee (MEAC), Council and staff briefings and an Environmental photography competition.

The draft was developed and accepted by Council and placed for public exhibition for four weeks. Thirteen submissions were received these included individuals, community groups, Catchment Management Authorities the EPA and MEAC.

Changes made including the development of the vision "Our community supports a healthy and resilient natural environment". References to additional Council strategies and plans, references to individual reserve management plans not added – as there are too many.

- New community groups listed as requested
- Added additional examples of Council Programs and Plans
- Included prospective landholders in environmental education
- Added reference to threatened and vulnerable flora and fauna species under Biodiversity.
- Promote and enforce laws for illegal activities such as native vegetation removal, rubbish dumping and illegal earthworks

- Advocate for a review of waterway frontage licenses
- Evaluation questions formed using the purpose statements
- Recognition of the need for management approaches to be adaptive to change has been added to Section 5.
- The Implementation of the Environment Strategy is an action of the 2013-2017 Council plan

### Actions that support cooperation between Council and APS

- Review and implement existing information kit for new rural landholders;
- Implement and/or support existing education programs (workshops, seminars, field days and publications) on environmental and sustainable land management for Council staff and the community;
- Ensure information for all new and prospective landholders (urban and rural) includes information on fire risk, environmental assets and threats, local community environmental groups and Shire environmental programs;
- Collaborate with and support initiatives undertaken by community environmental groups and Committees of Management e.g. group activities, Golden Sun Moth monitoring, Mynah bird trapping, Clean Up Australia Day; and
- Continue to assist in the promotion and distribution of information on sustainable land management practices.
- Ensuring that the Sustainable Gardening Guide as part of new rural landholder kits?
- Joint public landscaping opportunities?

## Garden Guide-What's to do in September...

Finally it is spring! The warmer weather has our wild flower season starting earlier than usual.

According to the Kilmore Gap weather station, our August rainfall was the lowest it has been in 18 years. As September is the month to start planting your native seedlings, a little more attention to aftercare watering is advisable.

To begin, apology in advance to the many members who already have a good understanding of tube stock planting techniques. For those of you (like myself) who are not 'old hand' at this, I would like to share the following invaluable instructions, given to me a few years ago by Ian Taylor (of Western Plains Flora):

Should the tube stock be on the dry side, it helps to place the plants, neck deep, into a bucket of water for a couple of hours. This will replenish the plant's energy and reduce the shock of transplanting from tube to garden.

When removing the plant from it's tube, give the bottom of the tube a sharp tap (you can use the side of your mattock or a nice flat stone for this). Then turn the tube upside down and give several more sharp knocks against the top rim of the tube. This releases the plant from the tube sides, making it easy for the root ball to slide out.

At this point of the instructions lan looked at me over the rim of his glasses and emphasised that I should 'never' attempt to pull the plant from the tube by it's trunk or foliage. Nor 'under any circumstances' squeeze or manipulate the tube sides to extract the plant! 'And', he added, 'if you have hundreds of plants to plant then don't fiddle'! 'The process of planting should take no more than a minute'. 'Any more time, and you are fiddling', moreover 'you will become overwhelmed by the enormity of your task, and the job won't get done'.

It was great advice.

Now back to the planting!

Taking care not to disturb the root system, place the plant into your prepared garden hole together with a little extra water. The extra water acts as a reservoir for the young plant, and helps it to establish a deeper and strong root system.

Back fill the hole and tap down the soil. Add a little more water around the root zone. This aids in the removal of air pockets around the plant's roots.

Keep the new plantings weed free. Weeds compete for water and nutrients.

Conserve soil moisture by mulching around the new plants. Aged Eucalyptus mulch is great for this as well as being a weed suppresser.

Watering occasionally is essential until the plants are well established.

I hope that you enjoy the warmer, brighter weather, and happy spring planting!

<u>Bev and John Hanson's Garden</u>, 104 Webb Street, Warrandyte. Parking on road and on site. Sensitively placed rocks around beautiful fern-edged ponds reflect Bev Hanson's work with Ellis Stones. Her knowledge and love of all plants is evident in the rich collection of natives leading to bushland and the separate area of generously planted exotics. Courtyards lead off the house with vistas opening through tunnels of foliage. 0.4ha (1ac).

<u>Yallaroo Gardens</u>, the new home of Bob and Dot O'Neill. 7 Hillsmeade Drive, Narre Warren South. A wide range of WA leschenaultias in many colours is one highlight of a beautiful young garden filled with flowers. Over 2000 plants flourish in sweeping beds created by a knowledgeable and passionate native plant enthusiast and former Gardening Australia 'Gardener of the Year'. Vegetable gardens, covered orchard. 0.4ha (1ac).

<u>Alcheringa</u>, 46 Victoria Ave, Rosanna. The classic 1970s bush-style native garden with stone work by Gordon Ford embraces a house designed by Alistair Knox. A rock waterfall is the central feature and supports a happy frog population. Butterfly-attracting indigenous plants feature among gymea lilies, banksias, croweas, callistemons and paperbarks. Small productive area. 18m x 40m.

<u>Illyarrie</u>, 7 Library Rd, Balnarring Beach. Garden is on corner of Hansens Lane. Rare and beautiful Australian plants create year-round interest and a carpet of early spring colour in this elegant garden. Many Western Australian species thrive in the sandy soil, including unusual banksias and grevilleas, and repeat plantings create a cohesive design. Large collection of Australian orchids in flower. 0.1ha (0.25ac).

<u>Airlie</u>, 10 Grandview Ave, Ringwood East. Harmoniously designed and elegant woodland garden with mass plantings of unusual small eucalypts including *E pumila* and *E luehmanniana* featured with tall grasses and a beautiful large frog pond at the front.

Grasses, groundcovers and a landscaped dam are a haven for wildlife.

<u>Ungulla Country Garden</u>, 590 Invermay Rd East, Athlone (near Drouin)

Century old eucalypts grace this sustainable, water wise garden of mainly bird attracting native species. BBQ. Talks at 11 am and 2 pm on organic vegetable growing and sustainable gardening practices.

#### 22nd & 23rd November

<u>Kerry's Garden</u>, 27 Como St, Alphington. A contemporary Australian plant garden featuring an innovative mix of native plants complemented by carefully selected exotic shrubs & perennials. Grasses, kangaroo paws, gymea lilies, a copse of *Eucalyptus tetragona* framed by lilly pillys.
