### Standard of the Month, November...

#### GREVILLEA bipinnatifida

There are several forms of *G. bipinnatifida* (Grape Grevillea), a bush to 2 metre high x 3 metre wide, prostrate forms, different leaves and different coloured flowers. This smaller flower form flowers for an extended period, has huge amounts of bird attracting flowers, is frost tolerant to -4c and when staked properly is not easily damaged by our Wallan gales.

A good all rounder, *G. bipinnatifida* is one of the parents of the Robyn Gordon, Superb, Coconut Ice, Ned Kelly and more. (*G. banksii* being the other parent.)

If grown in a pot it would make a great Aussie Xmas tree with no decorations required.

The warmer weather and longer daylight brought out a good number of members to our October meeting including eight newly joined members who signed up at the Spring Expo. It was a great pleasure to see so many new faces.

Before handing over to Bill Aitchison for the evening's presentation Neil had an additional announcement to make and related the sad news that Dr Russell Best has recently passed away. Russell was a senior lecturer at Victoria University, co-author of the books *Macedon Ranges Flora* and *Plants of Melbourne's Western Plains*. He had long been an active member of the Australian Plant Society and was also well known for his work with the Barrm Birrm Nature Reserve in Riddells Creek and the NatureShare database. A good number of our group members have fond memories of Russell Best and the "famous ferret night" in July 2013 when he visited as guest speaker to talk about citizen science and NatureShare. At the beginning of the evening Maureen had discovered what she thought might be a rat in the kitchen but on closer inspection turned out to be a ferret. The local ranger was contacted and collected the animal but not before Russell had taken a photo of the interloping ferret and used the image in part of his talk to demonstrate making a citizen science observation and how to record the observation at www.natureshare.org.au.

#### Acacias...

Bill Aitchison commenced his presentation by mentioning he last spoke to our group in July 2010 so would give a different talk this visit and discuss the Acacia Study Group, some of it's activities over the last five years and finish up with "A Wattle in your garden in flower every month of the year".

Bill is the current leader of the Acacia Study Group which has members from all around Australia and even a couple of overseas members. The group was established in the 1960's and currently has 120 members. It's aims are to further knowledge about the cultivation, propagation and conservation of *Acacia*. Regular newsletters are issued recording the activities, experiences of the group members and providing information on cultivating acacias, keeping up to date on scientific knowledge of the genus and reporting on field trips to various parts of Australia. The most recent field trip was made just a few months ago in August 2015 to the Northern Tablelands NSW. This area was previously visited by the study group in 2012. For the current visit the group had the benefit of a very knowledgeable local from Armadale NSW by the name of John Nevin lead the trip. Maria Hitchcock who is known as "The Wattle Lady" was also there. Over the 2 day weekend 51 different species were recorded – nearly all of the species known to be in the region. Among the species found were:

**Acacia neriifolia** – Oleander Wattle, named for having a leaf shape similar to Oleander but fortunately is not poisonous.

**Acacia leptoclada** – A bipinnate leaved Acacia which also strikes well from cuttings, some cuttings have been known to root within a few days.

**Acacia betchei** – Which has reddish leaves and is found in the region of Glen Innes. Growing at an elevation of 1000m and experiencing and average of 93 minus 12c frosts per year the red colouration is thought to equate to anti-freeze protection.

Acacia ixodes - A new observation record for the area.

For their 2014 field trip the study group visited the Barakula State Forest north of Chinchilla in Queensland. The

name Barakula means Big Timber, and the forest with an extensive road system and covering 260,000 hectares is said to be the largest State Forest in the southern hemisphere. Len Hubbard acted as guide on this field trip. Over the 3 day trip every one of the 56 known species in the region was found. There are 4 species are endemic only to Barakula, these are: **Acacia chinchillensis, Acacia handonis, Acacia barakulensis & Acacia striatifolia**.

Some other species seen were:

**Acacia flexifolia** – Seen being visited by a Bee Fly. *Acacia* are pollinated by insects.

**Acacia semilunata** – Common in the Darling Downs Queensland and were conspicuously in flower at the time of this visit.

**Acacia spectabilis** – Grace Lithgow (of Chinchilla) has written a book mentioning *A. Spectabilis* as "tasty in cooking" citing use in fritters and pancakes.

**Acacia leichhardtii** – Also received a mention (in Grace's book) as good for floral displays.

**Acacia debilis** – Found along creeks and gullies in sandy conditions. Also holds well in floral displays (add vinegar to the water to extend duration of display).

Moving on from field trips Bill advised the Study Group also has a photo library and went on to light heartedly let us know it includes "some of the worst photos of Acacias you'll ever see". The first image of the now well known Red Wattle – *Acacia leprosa* "Scarlet Blaze" is among the collection. Bush walkers at Wilhelmina Falls in Murrindindi first discovered and photographed the lone specimen in 1994. The image showed the red form in the foreground with the usual yellow form in the background. Another image shown was *Acacia purpureopetala* an endangered species from Irvine Bank in Northern Queensland which only grows in a limited area. A stunning image by Chris Clarke (of the Keilor Group) taken in Bendigo of *Acacia acinacea* was up next. It showed the Gold Dust Wattle the in full bloom filling and lighting up the forest understorey.

From time to time the Study Group also has cause to write letters regarding issues relating to Acacias. One letter written was to the WA Premier and Environment Minister on the subject of protecting *Acacia shapelleae* and *Acacia adinophylla*. These two species are endemic to the Helena and Aurora Range which is located one days drive from Perth. The range is a geological feature of banded ironstone formation under threat from "mining interest". Subjects of another letter have been *Acacia phlebophylla* from Mackey Lookout Mt Buffalo, *Acacia maidenii* from Orbost and *Acacia victoriae* found near Kings Canyon which is grown to produce wattle seed for bush food. The letter was written in response to Government proposing to ban the propagation of *Acacia* due to the psychoactive alkaloid Dimethyltryptomene (DMT) known or suspected to be found in some species.

Occasionally the Study Group receives and answers questions via email. One question was from a gentleman in America wanting to use Acacia seed for culinary purposes. As he was unable to buy Acacia seed in America but had access to some plants he wanted to know if *Acacia podalyriifolia* seed is safe to eat. Enquiries were made on the gentleman's behalf and a response was made that it probably was safe to eat. As the man was familiar with the symptoms of food poisoning he decided to go ahead with a personal trial and later reported that he made and consumed several litres of Wattle Seed Ice-cream over a the period of a week or so with no ill effect.

There have been a number of group leaders over the years with the previous group leader being Esther Brueggemeier. Some leaders and members have had plants named after them, *Acacia desmondii* – The Des Nelson Wattle is one. Des Nelson is also connected with the Olive Pink Botanic Gardens Alice Springs. In Bruce Maslin's case along with *Acacia masliniana* Bruce has also had rust fungi named after him. *Acacia masliniana* is found at the edges of salt lakes. The galls found on Wattles are the result of rust fungi such as *Endoraecium*

podalyriifolium and Endoraecium maslinii.

A database of common names is also something the Study Group is working on. In some cases the same plant can have many different common names. *Acacia stenophylla* which has 19 different common names and 18 different species with the same common name "Black Wattle" are just a couple of examples. Some other common names are:

**Cat Bush - Acacia pentadenia** which is found in the Frankland State Forest WA earned the common name from its offensive odour.

Reindeer Bush – Acacia aphylla, so named for it's antler like foliage.

Hairy Pod Wattle - Acacia glandulicarpa

Jumping-jack Wattle - Acacia enterocarpa named after the firework.

A final Study Group item of interest is it's association and reciprocal membership with The Wattle Day Association. The Wattle Day Association has a long history dating back to around 1910. Jack Fahey was the first president of the association and the current president is Terry Fewtrell. Terry Fewtrell is quoted as saying Wattle Day (September 1<sup>st</sup>) should become our Australia Day as "Wattle and National Wattle Day are unique celebrations of Australia, uncluttered by historical or cultural baggage because wattle comes from our land and is a symbol of that land". Currently January 26<sup>th</sup> is also viewed as "invasion day" and is culturally divisive so September 1<sup>st</sup> would be a more unifying option. Events to celebrate Wattle Day are held all around the country, one event is held at Hurstbridge on the last weekend in August each year at which APS Yarra Yarra host a display. In the past Wattle Day was much more widely celebrated than it currently is today in 1913 it was common for trains to be decorated with Wattle for the

day. There is also a "Golden Wattle Award" which is given in recognition of an individual's contribution who has brought "Gold" to Australia through their actions or achievements. The most recent recipients were Mick Fanning & Julian Wilson, recognised and honoured for their courage, mateship and fortitude in facing the recent shark attack at Jeffreys Bay in South Africa.

#### Lastly - A Wattle in your garden in flower every month of the year...

#### January:

- Acacia implexa
- Acacia elata

#### February:

- Acacia provincialis Previously known as A. retinoides form
- Acacia uncinata An arching species that flowers January through to mid year.

#### March:

• Acacia linifolia - Flowers February to October.

#### April:

 Acacia terminalis – Has red glands, more sugar in the nectar so is attractive to and pollinated by birds. A pink variety "Pink Sunshine" from Tasmania might be released in Autumn next year.

#### May:

 Acacia fauntleroyi – Has Minni-ritchi type bark and flowers from January through to June/July.

- · Acacia beckleri
- Acacia trigonophylla

#### July:

• Acacia chrysocephala - A small growing acacia.

#### August:

- Acacia imbricata
- Acacia boormanii Suckers and can be weedy.
- · Acacia guinetti

#### September:

- Acacia fimbriata Dwarf form Grows to 2-3m high. The tree form usually grows 8-10m.
- Acacia fimbriata Crimson Blush Grown for the foliage.
- Acacia covenii
- Acacia acinacea

Acacia gordonii – From the Blue Mountains west of Sydney and now an endangered species due to urbanisation.
 Some were planted at the Royal Botanic Gardens Cranbourne but Swamp Rats were attracted to and ate the roots so have since been replanted in a different area of the gardens.

#### October:

Acacia triptera

#### November:

- Acacia subulata Has a pleasant aroma, attractive foliage and is fast growing.
- Acacia caerulescens Rare and from the Buchan region.

#### December:

• Acacia muelleriana

#### January - December:

 Acacia longissima – Flowers 12 months of the year and can always be seen in flower at Maranoa Gardens.


