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Gardens for Wildlife News...

Recently at Wattle Gum Forest Farm, we've been enjoying experimenting with a wildlife camera, setting it up in various places around the property. It's confirmed a long held belief that we had a wombat inhabiting a burrow deep inside a hollow at the base of a grand old *Eucalyptus camaldulensis* River Red Gum. It's also given us a surprise or two capturing birds we hadn't known were visiting; One, a juvenile Butcher Bird, the other, a pair of Pacific ducks on our seasonal creek. A wildlife camera is definitely an excellent investment for a Garden for Wildlife.

Lastly, local Wattle and two small plants in flower at Wattle Gum Forest Farm...

Acacia pycnantha Golden Wattle, is beginning to get to full bloom around the district. Currently along the Broadford-Glenaroua Rd, there is a stand out patch lighting up the roadside. *A. pycnantha* is an understorey shrub to small tree found in woodland, forest and scrub, which, is endemic to SA, Vic, NSW & ACT. It can be variable in habit growing from 3 to 8m tall, is tolerant of moderate frost, and will grow in a range of soil types with good drainage. It does tend to be short-lived in cultivation.

Dampiera salahae is an eye catching ground cover when in full flower. I first saw this plant on a visit to Melton Botanic Garden, with the FMBG nursery being where my specimens came from in 2019. It is endemic to the Geraldton area of WA, and grows to around 0.5m high with a spread of up to 1m. Flowers occur winter spring, mainly August to November. It is said to tolerate light frost, and so far has coped with Pyalong's frosts. Best situated in a full sun position, tolerant of both constantly moist soil and dry periods.

Boronia crenulata Aniseed Boronia is turning out to be a hardy little plant in the garden. It is endemic to the south west of WA, and is found growing in a wide variety of soils. It grows to around 1m and bears bright pink flowers much of the year, with a main flush occurring in late winter to spring. A dappled shade to part-sun site in moist, well-drained, humus rich soil is recommended. I have it currently growing in full sun, where it appears to be quite happy. It is said to propagate fairly easily from cuttings and is also a good container plant.

Dillwynia cinerascens - Grey Parrot-pea...

Dillwynia cinerascens or Grey Parrot Pea

The term "egg and bacon" plant is a simple description for what is in fact a large variety of pea plants that have yellow and red-orange flowers. The identification of these species is quite complicated and in part can be based on the structural detail of the flower. A seminal text on this subject suggests the use of a strong magnifying glass.[#] In common with all peas, the flowers have five petals. The single petal at the top is double lobed and is the "standard", there are two smaller "wing" petals and below these the "keel" petals, which surround the reproductive organs. The calyx consists of the fused sepals. Flower colour and shape, the shape of the calyx, the presence or absence of bracteoles, bracts and stipules and the arrangement of all ten stamens, each influence identification. The nature of the seed pod and presence or absence of a white attachment site (aril) on the seed are also important to speciation.

The plant illustrated (top right & next page)

in this article is growing in an isolated patch on the Kilmore-Lancefield Rd and is not seen elsewhere in the immediate area. According to David Laurie, our local expert on native flora, this species has widespread distribution but is not common, being generally found in local bush remnants in wetter parts of the shire. In this little pocket of low-lying ground, it is growing close to Yellow Box, Candlebark Gums and a large clump of Cherry Ballart. It is surrounded by native grasses including Poa sp., Kangaroo and Wallaby grasses. *Burchardia umbellata* or Milkmaids also make their appearance nearby. It's a very small parcel of bush, just beyond the zone of roadside slashing. During the 2014 Mickleham fires, this area of undergrowth was reduced to ash but has regenerated strongly.

There are approximately 20 species of the genus *Dillwynia*, they have narrow leaves, the edges are rolled up and tucked inward (involute). The leaves are positioned alternatively. The flowers occur in terminal clusters or in leaf axils high on the stem. *Dillwynia* have small egg-shaped seed pods, usually containing one, or rarely two seeds of 3mm length. One of the features used to group Australian Pea-flowered Legumes is the arrangement of the stamens. In Group 1, all ten stamens are free to their base. This large group includes *Dillwynia* and the genera *Daviesia*, *Eutaxia*, *Mirbelia*, *Oxylobium* and *Pultenaea*. There are a further two groupings; Group 2 has all ten stamens joined together for a substantial proportion of their length, examples include: *Bossiaea*, *Goodia*, *Hovea* and *Platylobium*. Group 3 has nine of the ten stamens joined, while the upper stamen

remains free for its full length; these include: Glycine, Hardenbergia, Indigofera, Kennedia and Swainsona.

Who was Dillwyn? The genus *Dillwynia* was described in 1805 by James Edward Smith, to honour Lewis Weston Dillwyn, in recognition of his scientific work in describing algae. Dillwyn was the son of a Pennsylvanian Quaker, an anti-slavery campaigner, who had fled the American Civil War to return to Essex. In addition to his expertise in botany, in later life Lewis become an MP and manufacturer of porcelain.

The Showy Parrot Pea, *D. sericea* is the floral emblem of APS Mitchell. As the adjective showy suggests, this species is probably more highly regarded than *D. cinerascens* and most illustrations typically depict a more pinkish-apricot coloured flower. However flower colour in these species can be variable. The species name notates silky long hairs rather than the presumed cerise colour. The leaves of this species are slightly thicker (<1mm), more rigid and obviously hairy when compared to *D. cinerascens*. Leaf size for both is from 5-20mm, but the leaves of the latter are slightly recurved with non-spiky tips. Collection of seed may be difficult as pods ripen over the course of 1-2 days and seed is expelled. Propagation is from seed or cutting; Victorian Native Seed recommend to cover seeds in boiling water and leave in the water for 30 minutes to encourage moisture uptake.



Very kindly, Russell gave permission to reprint an excerpt from *Growing Eremophila* in this newsletter edition (see the following page). It was suggested to Russell that it might be most apt to share the page on *Eremophila waitii*, which, is one of a few new species found by Russell over the years, and has been named after it's finder. Very generously Russell has also shared his story of finding *E. waitii*...

While travelling on a gravel road south of Mullewa in 2018, I saw some grey bushes in a small patch of scrub, and wondering what they were, I jumped the fence to check, finding that the first few plants were not in flower.

Looking further, it was not until I found a bush with flowers that I was able to identify it as an *Eremophila*, not only that, it was a new one to me, and science. The striking thing about it was the arrangement of the flowers in a strobiloid structure (having the flowers in a tight cluster running up the stem). Most of the bushes were 1.75m high, with a couple taller specimens reaching to 2m tall and they only covered a small area of perhaps 20m x 15m. The bushes have a trunk of about 6 cm, looked quiet old, and there appeared to be about 50 plants. However, it is hard to tell, and I could not be sure without digging down to see if it is a single bush or more. The bushes had been heavily grazed for 6 or more months prior to my visit, and had put out a lot of new growth (which, is good for cutting material), although at the time of discovery the paddock had been put under crop.

I sent a couple of photos to Dr Bob Chinnock from Adelaide, who wrote the book Eremophila and allied genera, and it was eventually decided to call this new species *E waitii*. A couple of weeks later Bob was in WA and also collected specimens then subsequently wrote up the botanical description, which, took until 2019 to be published. *E. waitii* is closely related to *E. subangustifolia*, *E. microtheca* and *E. nivea*, and easily distinguished from these species by the well-defined strobiloid inflorescence flower structure. I returned to the site in 2019, deciding that I should photograph myself by one of the bushes. To self-photograph is only successful if everything works properly, which, for me, it just would not. So I had given up and was walking back to the car when I heard another car coming, I flagged the driver down, who turned out to be the property's owner. He was very nice about it, then helped to take the photos, and followed up by taking me around his paddocks to see if we could find some more plants, this time without luck. He also said that organisers of the Mullewa flower show come out each year onto his property to collect flowers for their show, as he has quite a bit of scrub on his property (my guess is about 500 ha).

To date I have found a few undescribed Eremophila species since 1997, so far only one has been named.

Eremophila waitii

Silky Lavender

Derivation Discovered by and named after author Russell Wait; collector, curator of the Australian Eremophila Collection. **Natural habitat** Clay soil on slopes in mallee woodland. **Description** A shrub 1-2m high by 1-1.5m wide with grey leaves 10-20 mm long by 0.5-0.9mm wide; medium sized corolla is deep lilac; small sized sepals are dark purple and hairy. Flowers in spring. **Cultivation** Closely related to *E. subangustifolia*; probable that it will handle similar growing conditions. Recently discovered, more research required. **Author's note** Brightly coloured flowers are densely clustered at branch tips. Occasionally emits a distinctive odour.

COVID Safe Plan For APS Mitchell Group Inc. Organisation

PURPOSE

Mitchell Shire Council requires a COVID-19 Safe plan for groups and organisations who wish to return using Council owned or managed facilities. The following plan supports a safe approach for building use. Council welcomes the inclusion of any special guidance from your peak bodies and associations where this has been provided.

SCOPE

This plan applies to all people entering the KILMORE LIBRARY JOHN TAYLOR ROOM building located at 12 SYDNEY STREET KILMORE in line with the easing of COVID-19 restrictions identified by the Department of Health and Humans Services.

PLAN

3.1 Pre-Return Risk Assessment

Prior to people attending the site a Risk Checklist must be completed identifying how the requirements for physical distancing and people density will be maintained. A checklist to enact the plan is attached in Appendix 1

3.2 Considering groups needs

Organisers will discuss potential vulnerabilities with all group members and encourage individual participants to consider their own risk and need to attend. The group may need to consider supporting different members depending on their circumstances. Circumstances may have changed post COVID-19, for example they may now have additional carer's responsibility or family members with specific health risks.

Social and physical vulnerabilities that might affect a person attending the facility include:

- Immune-compromised: may limit attendance or may require additional controls
- Social isolation: managing return to social settings may not be easy for some people
- Need to assist family with child minding or other activities

Our plan for managing our members is:

- Sending Covid-19 safe plan to all members with the meeting groups notice
- A copy of the Covid-19 Safe plan with the meeting registration book
- Limit numbers to current DHS prescribed restriction number's
- Update all members as circumstances change

Any person who is unwell should not enter the building. This includes presenting with cold or flu symptoms including fever, runny nose, coughing, sore throat, aches or diarrhea. People with symptoms will be asked to leave.

This plan has been communicated to all affected members of the group.

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3.3 Return to facilities

3.3.1 Physical distancing measures

Physical distancing measures mean that people from separate households must be more than 1.5 metres from each other. In addition, a minimum space of 2 metres x 2 metres is required for every person in any room they access.

Spaces (e.g. corridors) where there is a potential for people to come in contact with each other may exist in the building. It is acceptable that people walk past each other in these spaces as the amount of time they are together is minimal. However, they are not to stop in these spaces and, if possible, the movement of members should be managed so that people will not physically brush past each other in this space.

Rooms in the building and the maximum number of people allowed (subject to current restriction limits on total numbers):

Room Name	Size (width X depth)	Max people (width x depth/2)
John Taylor Room		Max 40 people

Signs will be placed into any room where the maximum occupancy is less than the maximum allowed into the entire facility to advise that people are to wait until the room is vacated.

Cleanliness

Cleaning arrangements for the building are to be documented.

On entry to the building it is advised that every person wash their hands with soap and water or carries hand sanitiser to apply at entry. Everyone should avoid touching their faces.

For this building, at the end of every session any equipment and all tables and chairs used by the members need to be cleaned by the meeting organiser using soap and water with washable or disposable cloths. Spray and wipe is also satisfactory for cleaning.

Chairs with soft covers will, where possible, not be used as these are difficult to wipe down.

Council clean as per schedule arranged with the Contracts Management Coordinator at Mitchell Shire Council. This this has been communicated to each building manager.

COVID-19 Infection

If a member is diagnosed with COVID-19, the following process will apply:

- Notify members who may have had contact with the person per DHHS guidance
- Ensure the privacy of the individual is maintained
- Seek assistance from Council contact
- Inform Council to arrange a deep clean of the building

3.6 Breach of the policy

Everyone will be treated with respect and it is expected that members will adhere to guidelines to physical distancing to help minimise the risk of COVID-19 being spread. Should someone test positive who attended a meeting space their privacy will be maintained, however Council will need to support a contact tracing regime to inform others.

- Advised patrons to hand wash/ hand sanitise as soon as they enter the building (consider leaving the outer toilet door propped open to avoid touching)
- Soap and water or disinfectant spray and disposable cloth (e.g. paper towel) available to clean surfaces touched
- □ Gloves available
