Gardens for Wildlife news...

G4W Spotlight Species: Prostanthera lasianthos

Christmas this year may not be the joyful affair of yore for some of us, with humanity seemingly determined to dig itself a deeper trench than the fissure from the last epidemic. Thankfully, nature has a timely remedy: the Victorian Christmas Bush (*Prostanthera lasianthos*), a shrub (or small tree) with spectacular snow-white December blossom and minty fragrance to uplift any lost or desperate soul.



P. lasianthos has a fairly large geographic range stretching from Tasmania to the wet sclerophyll forests in Queensland. Not too surprisingly, it is a variable and taxonomically complex species, and two varieties are recognised in Victoria: *P. lasianthos* var. *lasianthos* and *P. lasianthos* var. *subcoriacea*. Locally, we would expect to see the former, with longer leaves (60–95 mm long, compared to 30–46 mm) and taller form in gullies or moist shady areas.

That said, the VCB is a popular plant in urban gardens, with different forms available

commercially (such as 'Kallista Pink'—a mauve form found in Kallista). To encourage growth, good drainage and moist soil are essential. VCB tolerates light frost, but should be sheltered from wind. Flowers are food sources for native bees and wasps.

Cuttings are the preferred way to propagate VCB. Cuttings of half-hard material typically strike well in spring and autumn. The sapling should be watered until it is established.

Ian & Christine for a host of behind the scenes organisation, management, front of house work, and other tasks too numerous to mention.


Norbert, for many and varied tasks including locating a new venue.

In closing Christine mentioned that she would love for everyone to hassle Norbert to give her the dinner receipt for set up evening (which, he had yet to provide). Russell Wait was then invited to take the floor next, passing around his own, and other members specimens that had been brought in. An anecdote first mentioned was that recently, visitors came from Belgium to see Russell's Eremophila collection for the purposes of medical research, as there are a number of species used by traditional people for the purposes of healing.

Species shown were:

Eremophila drummondii is Named for James Drummond, a West Australian Botanist. It can be variable in growth, ranging from 0.30m-2m high x 2m wide, and bears linear, vivid green leaves, with flower colour forms including white, pink and lilac. Peak flowering occurs in spring or sporadically following new growth. It copes with most frosts and does best in a sunny site, but will tolerate a little shade.

Russell explained that an Eremophila chimera equals a weed. Chimera can occur when grafting, where the rootstock and scion form a callous, the cells from the two different species can combine to form another plant. In the case of the Russell's particular chimera, which, is on Myoporum rootstock with Eremophila scion, it can send any combination of genetics in it's shoots. In fact, it has had more than two different type shoots grow from it in the past. He is currently continuing to develop and propagate the interesting new plant that has formed, and intends to call it "Big John" after the explorer John Mackinlay, who was reputedly "a giant of a man", which, in those days were few & far between.

Eremophila glabra Bev Rice forms a compact bush growing to 1m x 1m and has grey foliage with green flowers. A hardy, bird attracting plant for a full sun site in well-drained soil.

Daviesia latifolia Broadleaf Bitter-pea or Hop Bitter-pea – has attractive leaves and is a very tough plant. It forms an open, erect to spreading shrub growing 1-3m high x 1-2m wide. Racemes of orange-yellow flowers with a maroon marking occur September to December, followed by obliquely triangular seed pods. Adaptable to most soils (except water-logged), and will grow in full sun or semi-shade. The leaves have medicinal properties and were used as a substitute for hops.

Olearia phlogopappa has a total of 9 subspecies, 6 of which, occur in Victoria. It forms a shrub growing to around 2m high and is a prolific flowerer (September to January) that is stunning in full bloom. Flower colour forms range from bright blues through mauves, white, magenta and pink. Its greyish green foliage is variable (depending on subspecies), but usually oblong and sometimes toothed. A hardy, if at times short lived shrub suited to well drained, moist soils in full sun or semi shade. Light pruning following flowering will increase vigour and extend the life of this species.

Eucalyptus gregsoniana Dwarf Snow Gum is growing in the shade of other trees and forms a compact tree growing to 2-4m high. It has also been known as E. pauciflora var. nana, and its natural range is in scattered populations in the Central and Southern Tablelands of NSW. It is a very cold tolerant plant with shiny green leaves, and bears white flowers during spring and summer.



Prostanthera melissifolia Balm Mint-bush comes in mauve, pink and white colour forms, is fast growing, forming a rounded shrub 1-2m wide x 2-3m high. Suited to moist, well-drained soils in a sheltered semi-shade to full shade position.

Prostanthera incisa Cut-leaf Mint-bush or Native Thyme is found in both pink and mauve-lilac forms and grows as a rounded shrub to 2m x 2m that bears aromatic leaves with toothed margins. Masses of pale lilac-mauve or pink flowers occurring in spring. Grows best in a partly shaded position, in moist, well-drained soil. A little water may be needed on hot days, as the plants will wilt readily if too dry. Tip pruning after flowering helps maintain a compact habit.



Eutaxia microphylla Small-leaved Eutaxia is a widespread species found Qld, NSW, Tas, SA, WA and Vic, including locally. It can be variable in habit, forming a low growing, densely branched prostrate plant of 0.5m x 0.5-1.5m. Yellow pea-flowers with red or purple streaks cover the plant from August to November. It tolerates both frost and dry conditions, will adapt to most soils, and if well-established will cope with brief periods of waterlogging, and periods of drought. Grows in full sun to full shade making it a great plant to grow under trees. An upright variety; Eutaxia microphylla var. diffusa can grow to around 1.5m high.

the Daisy Family that has a rosette of greygreen leaves and bright, pale yellow, buttonlike flowers held on 20-30cm stems, which, occur from October to February. It prefers well-drained soils and will grow in full sun or light shade.

Micromyrtus ciliata Fringed Heath Myrtle (Prostrate from) grows as a low, spreading shrub reaching 0.50m high x 1m wide (or more over time). It has small dark green leaves that are reminiscent of conifer and held on long arching stems. Profuse tiny white flowers that age to pink occur in an extended display from spring to summer. A



frost hardy plant that is suited to a full sun to part shade site in well drained soils.

Pimelea humilis Common Rice-flower or Small Rice-flower is found locally, and forms an erect to straggling low plant with a suckering habit that can grow from 0.10-0.30m high x up to 1m wide. It has small grey-green elliptic leaves and bears creamy white flowerheads from September to January. Grows best in moist to dryish well-drained soils in a full sun to part shade site, and can be planted under trees. A great little butterfly attracting plant.



Calotis scabiosifolia var. scabiosifolia Tufted Burr-daisy is a tufted perennial species endemic to Victoria that has ovate to spathulate leaves, spreads by rhizomes, and bears white flowers 15-30mm wide, which, are held on stalks

woodland plains areas west and north of Melbourne, but is now rarely found. Highly suitable as a bedding or container plant and is frost and drought resistant. *Calotis scabiosifolia* var. *integrifolia* bears mauve flowers October to January, has narrow oblong leaves and occurs in dry foothills grassy woodlands to the sub alps.

Mirbelia oxylobioides Mountain Mirbelia or Sandstone Bush-pea grows to around 1.5m high and can be sprawling to erect in habit. It is endemic to Vic, NSW, ACT and is listed as rare endangered in Tasmania. Orange-yellow flowers with red markings occur from late spring into early summer. Prefers

a semi-shaded site in well drained soils, and is frost and drought tolerant.

Eremophila compacta Compact Poverty Bush, a pink flowering form with grey leaves that grows to around 1m high and tolerates most frosts. Russell lists 2 subspecies in his book; *E. compacta* subsp. compacta (Compact Poverty Bush) and *E. compacta* subsp. fecunda (Fertile Emu Bush). Peak flowering occurs in spring, and sporadic flowers can occur after rain and new growth. Other colour forms are white, lilac and violet. It is best grown in a full sun open situation with free air movement, although a little shade can be tolerated.

Eremophila muelleriana forms a tall growing shrub to 2m, which, can be scraggly or dense in habit. It bears goldish to grey leaves and redpurple to deep purple flowers that can appear almost black. Flowering occurs in spring or after new growth. It is moderately frost tolerant and will take a little shade but will do best in a full sun site with good air movement.

Astus subroseus was named by Barbara Rye, a WA botanist, and is a rare endangered plant species. It is free flowering, producing bright pink flowers for 3-4 months of the year, and grows to around 1.5m.

Eremophila miniata, yellow form can reach 4-5m high and comes in pink and red colour forms. They are usually found growing around salty areas. All forms feature large calyxes that stay on the bush for some

time. It requires good air circulation, doing best in full sun yet tolerates some shade and most frosts.

Corymbia eximia 'Nana' is a selected cultivar and the species are members of Bloodwood family, which, was previously included in *Eucalyptus*. It forms a small tree, and is a

beautiful plant for a medium garden that puts on a great display of creamy white flowers in spring. *C. eximia* is endemic to the Central Coast region of NSW and grows from 5-15m high depending on site. It grows in dry rocky sites and is drought and moderately frost tolerant.

Grevillea nivea is endemic to a small area in WA near Esperance. It forms a dense spreading shrub to around 1.5-2m wide x 2-4m high. Bearing deeply divided leaves and bright red flowers held at, or near the ends of branches, making it a stunner when in flower. They respond well to pruning and grow best in sandy soils with a full sun aspect. Dawn's specimen is a grafted plant grown by Brian Weir.

Grevillea 'Coral Baby' is a small, low growing hybrid of Grevillea lavandulacea x G. chrysophaea that bears masses of soft pink flowers during winter and spring. It is bird attracting, grows in clay and loam soils, tolerates light frost, drought and coastal conditions.

Grevillea intricata is endemic to WA and forms a spreading, dense, elegantly attractive shrub that grows to 4m high x 2m wide. It has fine, needle-like foliage, red stems and creamy-white, greenish flowers occur throughout the year.

A Walk on Mount Disappointment 30th November 2022...

The last Sunday morning of November was a beautiful morning. The rains that drenched the state and caused Central Victorians grief and misery over the previous weeks now seemed incongruent, with only sodden soil reminding bushwalkers of past deluge.

Eight of us met at an impromptu parking area on South Mountain Road that was carved out of the bush by mountain biking enthusiasts. The plan was to walk along Sheils Road, turn south on to Sheils Road fire break, and loop the loop on Dry Creek Road for a distance of 5 km. That was the plan, anyway.

Mount Disappointment was thus named when Hume and Hovell scaled the mountain on their 1824 expedition in an attempt to see Port Phillip Bay, only to be thwarted by dense vegetation. It might have been a let down for them, but for us the mountain put on a spectacular show from the bat.

Almost immediately, we came across a feast of eggs and bacon — Golden Bush-pea Pultenaea gunnii subsp. gunnii, with its delicate leaves only serving to push its yellow flowers into the limelight. Soon, another pea joined the show: Gorse Bitter-pea Daviesia ulicifolia subsp. ruscifolia, a cooked version of the Golden Bush-pea with a darker hue, and bitter to boot.

Some species took advantage of the openness afforded by bush roads to make their home on the track edges. We spotted a Common Appleberry Billardiera mutabilis clinging to the bank, and clumps of Wattle Mat-rush Lomandra filiformis, likely subspecies coriacea.

Not surprisingly, some weeds too thrived on track edges: American Everlasting Gamochaeta americana, ubiquitous Cat's Ear Hypochaeris spp. and Common Selfheal Prunella vulgaris.

Thankfully, our indigenous species appeared to hold fast against introduced species. Further west along Sheils Road, we sighted Hop Goodenia Goodenia ovata (a good plant for many backyards), Common Rice-flower Pimelea humilis, and Love Creeper Comesperma volubile draping over other vegetation.

Stretches of the track bank were carpeted by Flat-pea *Platylobium* montanum, better known to some as Platylobium formosum. That has since been split, with two subspecies of *P. montanum* in the state. Based on its habit, the Sheils Road population was P. montanum

subsp. prostratum Prostrate Flat-pea. Two other pea plants we sighted were Purple Coral-pea Hardenbergia violacea and egg-and-bacon Grey Parrot-pea Dillwynia cinerascens.

An elevated embankment proved to be fertile ground. In quick succession, we found Yam Daisy Microseris sp., Variable Stinkweed Opercularia varia, Early Nancy Wurmbea dioica, Butter-cup Ranunculus sp., White Marianth Rhytidosporum procumbens, Common Cassinia Cassinia aculeata subsp. aculeata, and for a welcome change, a native plantain, Plantago varia Variable Plantain rather than the weedy P. lanceolata.

Also in flower were Creamy Candles Stackhousia monogyna, and amazingly, fungi could still be seen. Waiting in the wings were Button Everlasting Coronidium scorpioides and Bear's-ears Cymbonotus preissianus, while we managed to catch vestigial Common Heath Epacris impressa in flower.

I was careful not to promise an abundance of orchid; a precursory walk a week before yielded few specimens. However, on Sunday we found Spider Orchid Caladenia sp. and Bird Orchid Chiloglottis sp. a little deeper in the scrub, and many *Thelymitra* that were yet to flower. Disappointingly, we also found exotic African Weed-orchid Disa bracteata, a highly invasive species by dint of its copious seed production.

We spent so much time marvelling over these wonders that we never did manage to complete the walk, for we had the afternoon open garden visit to go to. Mount Disappointment does or does not live up to its name (depending on what you want to see); we hope you can join us on the next trip there in 2023.

Lastly, a very special note of thanks to Danielle Hickford, who brought the beautiful pocket of wildflowers on Mt Disappointment to attention, and suggested the idea of a walk there.

WAMA RECEIVES \$6.75M STATE GOVERNMENT FUNDING

The WAMA Foundation Ltd. has received \$6.75M from the Victorian State Government as part of the Regional Tourism Infrastructure Fund, to support the delivery of a \$9M Art Gallery facility, significantly boosting the local economy, and diversifying the tourism offering within the Grampians region.

WAMA will be Australia's first art and environment precinct with the centrepiece being a world-class art gallery dedicated to art inspired by the natural environment, surrounded by indigenous wildlife, native botanic gardens and bushlands.

Chairman, Greg Lewin says "This funding will take WAMA from vision to realisation. The facility will be a welcome addition to tourism in the Grampians, broadening the cultural experience for visitors and locals. And importantly, building and operating WAMA will bring significant benefits to the local economy."

The funding will contribute significantly to building Stage 1 of the 16-hectare masterplan of the WAMA site to construct a state-of-theart, climate-controlled art gallery, café, retail shop and large multipurpose conference centre, with parking, visitor access pathways, landscaping and boardwalk.



Once open, the WAMA gallery will hold major exhibitions of art inspired by the natural environment, borrowing from top galleries and collections in Australia and internationally.

WAMA Patron Glenda Lewin says she is "delighted" and "it couldn't have come at a better time" as the Grampians region becomes increasingly popular for both domestic and international visitors.

"WAMA will offer a unique cultural destination by exploring the deep connections between the natural environment and art. There isn't anything else quite like it within Australia. We believe WAMA will be an internationally recognised tourist destination."

Greg Lewin says while the organisation has received this funding there is still more work to be done to raise money to complete the project.

"We have recently embarked on a Capital Campaign, turning our focus to philanthropy, to raise additional funds to ensure the project can be completed and our targets achieved."

"We have a great network of supporters who have helped us get this far however, now more than ever we need the support of the community behind us."

WAMA plans to be fully operational and open to the public by the end of 2024.

COVID Safe Plan For APS Mitchell Group Inc. Organisation

PURPOSE

Mitchell Shire Council requires a COVID-19 Safe plan for groups and organisations who wish to return using Council owned or managed facilities. The following plan supports a safe approach for building use. Council welcomes the inclusion of any special guidance from your peak bodies and associations where this has been provided.

SCOPE

This plan applies to all people entering the KILMORE LIBRARY JOHN TAYLOR ROOM building located at 12 SYDNEY STREET KILMORE in line with the easing of COVID-19 restrictions identified by the Department of Health and Humans Services.

PLAN

3.1 Pre-Return Risk Assessment

Prior to people attending the site a Risk Checklist must be completed identifying how the requirements for physical distancing and people density will be maintained. A checklist to enact the plan is attached in Appendix 1

3.2 Considering groups needs

Organisers will discuss potential vulnerabilities with all group members and encourage individual participants to consider their own risk and need to attend. The group may need to consider supporting different members depending on their circumstances. Circumstances may have changed post COVID-19, for example they may now have additional carer's responsibility or family members with specific health risks.

Social and physical vulnerabilities that might affect a person attending the facility include:

- Immune-compromised: may limit attendance or may require additional controls
- Social isolation: managing return to social settings may not be easy for some people
- Need to assist family with child minding or other activities

Our plan for managing our members is:

- Sending Covid-19 safe plan to all members with the meeting groups notice
- A copy of the Covid-19 Safe plan with the meeting registration book
- Limit numbers to current DHS prescribed restriction number's
- Update all members as circumstances change

Any person who is unwell should not enter the building. This includes presenting with cold or flu symptoms including fever, runny nose, coughing, sore throat, aches or diarrhea. People with symptoms will be asked to leave.

This plan has been communicated to all affected members of the group.

3.3 Return to facilities

3.3.1 Physical distancing measures

Physical distancing measures mean that people from separate households must be more than 1.5 metres from each other. In addition, a minimum space of 2 metres x 2 metres is required for every person in any room they access.

Spaces (e.g. corridors) where there is a potential for people to come in contact with each other may exist in the building. It is acceptable that people walk past each other in these spaces as the amount of time they are together is minimal. However, they are not to stop in these spaces and, if possible, the movement of members should be managed so that people will not physically brush past each other in this space.

Rooms in the building and the maximum number of people allowed (subject to current restriction limits on total numbers):

Room Name	Size (width X depth)	Max people (width x depth/2)
John Taylor Room		Max 40 people

Signs will be placed into any room where the maximum occupancy is less than the maximum allowed into the entire facility to advise that people are to wait until the room is vacated.

Cleanliness

Cleaning arrangements for the building are to be documented.

On entry to the building it is advised that every person wash their hands with soap and water or carries hand sanitiser to apply at entry. Everyone should avoid touching their faces.

For this building, at the end of every session any equipment and all tables and chairs used by the members need to be cleaned by the meeting organiser using soap and water with washable or disposable cloths. Spray and wipe is also satisfactory for cleaning.

Chairs with soft covers will, where possible, not be used as these are difficult to wipe down.

Council clean as per schedule arranged with the Contracts Management Coordinator at Mitchell Shire Council. This this has been communicated to each building manager.

COVID-19 Infection

If a member is diagnosed with COVID-19, the following process will apply:

- Notify members who may have had contact with the person per DHHS guidance
- Ensure the privacy of the individual is maintained
- Seek assistance from Council contact
- Inform Council to arrange a deep clean of the building

3.6 Breach of the policy

Everyone will be treated with respect and it is expected that members will adhere to guidelines to physical distancing to help minimise the risk of COVID-19 being spread. Should someone test positive who attended a meeting space their privacy will be maintained, however Council will need to support a contact tracing regime to inform others.
