Gardens for Wildlife news...

Norbert, Dawn & Gerry returned to hosting our seasonal G4W stall at the Wallan Market this month (2nd Saturday), and will continue each month, weather permitting, throughout the planting season (until conditions become too dry later in spring for successful planting). If you're in the vicinity on market days, do stop by and say hello. Information on G4W & endemic plant species will be available, along with plants and G4W membership packs for sale. Contact Norbert for further information or to confirm attendance at the market: Ph 0428 180 651.

Beginning this month, we'll be featuring an indigenous species that's both beneficial to our wildlife and readily available from nurseries or local growers. In the spotlight this month is: Acacia gunnii Ploughshare Wattle - a showy plant when in flower, but an often overlooked species. It forms an open low growing shrub reaching to 1m high x 1-2m wide that has prickly, stiff, asymmetrical triangular phyllodes (modified leaves), and bears single, pale yellow ball flowerheads at phyllode axils along its stems during winter and spring. Growing requirements are a well-drained soil in full sun to semi shade. A beneficial bird and pollinator attracting understorey plant, providing seed and insects, which, tolerates dryness once established, and can grow well under trees. February meeting report - Evening garden visit...

The evening of Monday February 21st saw Mike & I welcome Beryl, Russell, Julianne, Maureen, Pat, Victoria, Janis, Greg, Debbie, Gerry, Norbert, Christine & Ian to Wattle Gum Forest Farm for a garden visit - Our first Mitchell Group activity for this year. Thank you all for making the journey out to Pyalong, it can be a bit of a trek for some, and we greatly appreciated your effort and time spent to come along.

Late summer hadn't quite turned on the balmy evening we'd all hoped for, and a cool southerly breeze meant donning jackets to be comfortable while outdoors and wandering the garden. Which, we began to do by around 7pm...

The garden has been expanded out a little further, with new beds and areas beginning to be planted since our group's first visit in July 2019. New works include; a bed taking in all the trees along the home paddock front fence-line (the latest project underway), a small dam once in a fenced off chook yard is now being incorporated into the front gardens, and a rain swale garden feeding into a "frog pond" are new additions in the gardens to the rear of the house.

As we walked and talked some of the species that were in flower, or attracted attention and discussed were:

Eucalyptus scoparia Wallangarra White Gum is endemic to a small area near the town of Wallangarra QLD. It grows 6-15m tall, and as its name suggests, has white, smooth, powdery bark. The foliage is fine and pendulous forming a rounded willowish canopy. One has been planted in the centre of a small lawn area and two others have been used to replace other trees along the driveway.

Olearia pannosa Velvet Daisy-bush was planted in 2019. It is predominantly a SA species, although a subspecies is found in limited areas in Victoria. It can grow to around 1m, has large deep green leaves that are white and felty on the underside, and bears large white daisy flowers in spring.

Acacia lasiocarpa is a variable shrub that can grow from 0.2-1.5m high x 1-1.5m wide that has attractive bright green, ferny leaves. The low growing form is planted here and flowers in winter-spring.

Grevillea rhyolitica x victoriae bears bright red flowers most of the year with peak flowering in Spring and Autumn. It forms a rounded shrub to 1.5m, is hardy and makes a bright spot in the garden.

Acacia chinchillensis is another ferny leaved wattle, which, has very decorative, delicate silvery grey-green foliage. It forms a small spreading shrub growing to 1-2m, and flowers late winter- early spring.

Acacia pravissima Acacia pravissima Ovens Wattle is also quite decorative, with grey-green, wedge-shaped foliage. It generally grows to a large shrub or tree. Although there are smaller growing forms available, such as "Little Nugget", which, is the form planted here that is anticipated to only reach 1-2m high. At this time of year flower buds are already forming and they also make an attractive feature. Flowering occurs in September-October.

Halgania preissiana "Purple Haze" is a suckering small shrub that grows to 0.3m high x 0.4m wide, has greygreen, toothed, prickly leaves and bears eye-catching bright purple-blue, star-shaped flowers. Peak flowering time is September to February however, sporadic flowers can occur at other times. It is a hardy plant that is frost resistant and tolerates dry periods. Three were originally planted, with one surviving that is happily suckering, reaching an area around 1m x 0.5m wide. There is a complicated history of name changes with this

species: from *H. preissiana* to *H. anagalloides* var. *preissiana*, then simply included in with *H. anagalloides*. Currently, a new name of *Halgania* anagalloides var. Southern has been proposed, but is yet to be accepted.

Acacia glaucoptera Flat Wattle (purple leaved form) was planted in winter 2019 and currently has a spread of just over 1m. Last year's wetter season saw it die back a little, but it has since bounced back with considerable vigour over this summer. It can form a dome-shaped low shrub up to 3m wide, and has striking stem clasping phyllodes (modified leaves) that give the appearance of being winged, which, have attractive, purple-red new growth tips.

Casuarina cunninghamiana River Sheoak will grow to around 30m high and is endemic to ACT, NSW & QLD. It is an excellent tree for windbreaks or screening and can grow in good to poor soils, including clay. Suitable for areas with annual rainfall down to 500mm, it tolerates seasonal inundation, frost, and salt, but does best along permanent water sources. Five were planted in the garden during winter 2018, and are now close to, or over, two or three metres high. Two are located in the overflow drainage line from the small dam (AKA "the duck pond"), the other three along the south easterly edge of one of the younger garden beds, to hopefully create screening from the road and slow some of the strong southerly winds through that section of the garden.


Maireana brevifolia Small-leaf Bluebush was planted last August and is one of a number of salt tolerant species, including a variety of Saltbush species being used in plantings put in over the last two years around the "duck pond", which, takes saline discharge flow from a reverse osmosis system. Hence, also planting salt tolerant species along the pond's overflow drainage line. M. brevifolia grows to around 1m high x 0.6-1m wide forming and erect shrub, with succulent leaves 2-5mm long. Grows in seasonally wet soil in full sun.

Persoonia chamaepitys Prostrate or Mountain Geebung is a ground cover plant endemic to NSW that reaches 0.20m high and spreads to 2m. It's bright green, fine, pine-like foliage stands out, and yellow, evening scented, tubular flowers occur in summer and autumn. The specimen was sourced from Ironstone Park and is planted near rocks, in a mounded section of a bed, alongside Tetratheca ericifolia (that has deep pink, pendulous flowers in winter-summer), Minuria leptophylla Minnie Daisy (a regional, white flowered daisy species), Calocephalus citreus Lemon Beauty-heads and Eremophila "Beryl's Gem".

Eremophila "Beryl's Gem" is currently quite a young plant in the garden that should grow to 2m. It is an *E. calorhabdos* x *splendens* hybrid developed by Russell Wait, which, has attractive soft grey-green leaves, showy deep pink flowers and orange buds occurring most of the year, with a flush in spring or following new growth after rain. Suited to a sunny site, it can tolerate some shade and most frosts. Russell recommends pruning to create a denser bush.

Corymbia citriodora Lemon Scented Gum were a very optimistic planting for our area. This species is endemic to temperate and tropical coastal areas of Eastern Australia so it struggles to cope with heavy frosts. Out of 12 used in an initial 2012 driveway

avenue planting, all have experienced frost damage to some degree each year. Three have survived frost well enough (with protection in their first few winters) to make it above the frost zone around three to four years ago, Three have been able to take advantage of two recent mild winters and may reach a safe height this year. Three continue in a cycle of being frost burned back to near ground level each winter, reshooting from the base in summer, and are yet to reach past 2m high. Of three that did not survive, two have been replaced by *Eucalyptus scoparia*.

Eucalyptus albopurpurea Purple-flowered Mallee Box was once known Eucalyptus lansdowneana subspecies albopurpurea. The species is endemic to Kangaroo Island and the Eyre Peninsula in SA, and is a small tree that will grow to 5m. They are wind resistant, frost tolerant, prefer a well-drained soil and have a semi pendulous, straggly habit, with flower colour form that can vary from purple to mauve, white and pink. All up 11 have been planted here, as part of the driveway avenue (interplanted between the Corymbia citriodora). The initial two plants were purchased from Mike Williams, and the remainder came from Goldfields Revegetation (one of which, turned out to be an E. lansdowneana (identified by hot pink flowers & a slightly different leaf form). A couple of replacements were later purchased from Melton Botanic Garden. Of all the specimens planted so far, just one has turned out to be a purple flower form. Four have yet to flower and all the others are white flowered.


Eucalyptus lansdowneana Crimson Mallee is endemic to the south western area of the Gawler Ranges in the upper Eyre Peninsula SA. It grows to 2-6m high with dark pink to crimson-red flowers occurring in autumn to spring.

Scaevola aemula Purple Fanfare grows in full sun and prefers well-drained soil, is a suckering ground cover that will slowly spread 1-2m wide, and reach 0.30m high. Purple fan flowers cover the plant continuously during summer, and attract a variety of pollinators including Blue Banded Bees.

Banksia baueri Possum Banksia is a WA species that grows in full sun to light shade in well-drained soil, and can grow 2m x 3m. The specimens here were planted in 2011 & 2012, one has reached 1.5m high x 2m wide, the other 1m high x 2m wide. Both are tolerating heavy frost in winter, dry summers and have been flowering well for quite some years. The large furry looking flower spikes can reach 30cm x 15-20cm.

Lythrum salicaria Purple Loosestrife, was sourced from Western Plains Flora and is planted in the rain swale garden and one edge of the frog pond. Massed spires of purple-mauve flowers are held on the branch tips over spring and summer. It is a semi-aquatic perennial that will die back to rootstock during winter, and prefers a moist-wet, sunny site in poorly drained soils.

Davidsonia is a genus endemic to tropical and subtropical north eastern Australia consisting of three species. All are slender trees and have a sour but edible fruit recommended for using to make jams, sauces, chutneys and even a dry red wine. Although northern species, they can tolerate cooler southern conditions if given a consistently moist, humus rich, sheltered site in semi-shade, with protection from frost and wind. Fruits grow in bunches or on short stems close to the trunk, and are dark blue-purple on the outside and red on the inside when ripe.

Davidsonia pruriens Ooray or Queensland Davidson's plum is the tallest, growing up to 12m high. Young stems, leaves, flowers & fruits all have fine hairs that can cause itching.

Davidsonia jerseyana Davidson's plum or Mullumbimby plum is endemic to northern NSW and is listed as endangered. It usually grows around 5m high, although may reach up to 10m.

Davidsonia johnsonii Smooth Davidson's plum grows 5-10 meters high and has multiple branches with a spreading, leafy canopy. It is a very rare tree in the wild and listed as endangered.

Growing at Ironstone Park part 1...

A bright, warm, and sunny Sunday morning back on the 28th of November last year, saw seven APS Mitchell members meeting outside the front gate of Joan and Peter Broughton's Ironstone Park Nursery and garden in Heathcote. Once we were all assembled Pete invited us in, and generously gave more than two hours of his time to take us on a guided tour through their gardens. Now, I took quite a few photos on the day, however, only a few scant notes. So, what I plan to do, is a series of articles focusing only on 2 to 4 species each newsletter, until the photos have all been covered...

First up we were shown into the newest part of the garden that was only 18 months old at the time, and an ex horse paddock.

Callitris pyramidalis, the first plant I photographed, is a WA species. Pete's specimen had grown just enough to begin developing its characteristic shape. It bears multiple common names of Swamp Cypress Pine, Swan River Cypress Pine or King George's Cypress Pine, and will eventually grow to a shrub or small tree reaching between 4-8m high. If browsed on or damaged it may form multiple trunks, although it will generally have a narrow conical habit to around 2m wide. Branches are dense and upright, with female cones, which, mature to 2cm round that have attractive scales at their bases, and can remain persistent on the tree with viable seed for several years. It requires a light, well-drained soil, in an open sunny site and is very hardy, being both drought and frost resistant. It can be grown from seed sown in spring or autumn with the optimum germination

temperature range between 18-22 degrees Celsius, when

germination can occur in two to four weeks, provided conditions are suitable.

Moving along, Pete mentioned that Joan likes standard Grevillea, and "a happy wife equals a happy life" so of course there are plenty to be seen in the garden.

The grafted Grevillea "Goliath" became my next subject. It turns out there's not a lot of information to be found on this particular cultivar. Other than being named for the size of its large, vibrant red flowers that occur from spring through to autumn. It has soft green foliage similar in size and shape to Grevillea "Moonlight" and is said to be easy to grow, potentially reaching 3m wide x 3-5m high. Pruning is recommended to encourage more flowers and make the most of this very showy cultivar.

COVID Safe Plan For APS Mitchell Group Inc. Organisation

PURPOSE

Mitchell Shire Council requires a COVID-19 Safe plan for groups and organisations who wish to return using Council owned or managed facilities. The following plan supports a safe approach for building use. Council welcomes the inclusion of any special guidance from your peak bodies and associations where this has been provided.

SCOPE

This plan applies to all people entering the KILMORE LIBRARY JOHN TAYLOR ROOM building located at 12 SYDNEY STREET KILMORE in line with the easing of COVID-19 restrictions identified by the Department of Health and Humans Services.

PLAN

3.1 Pre-Return Risk Assessment

Prior to people attending the site a Risk Checklist must be completed identifying how the requirements for physical distancing and people density will be maintained. A checklist to enact the plan is attached in Appendix 1

3.2 Considering groups needs

Organisers will discuss potential vulnerabilities with all group members and encourage individual participants to consider their own risk and need to attend. The group may need to consider supporting different members depending on their circumstances. Circumstances may have changed post COVID-19, for example they may now have additional carer's responsibility or family members with specific health risks.

Social and physical vulnerabilities that might affect a person attending the facility include:

- Immune-compromised: may limit attendance or may require additional controls
- Social isolation: managing return to social settings may not be easy for some people
- Need to assist family with child minding or other activities

Our plan for managing our members is:

- Sending Covid-19 safe plan to all members with the meeting groups notice
- A copy of the Covid-19 Safe plan with the meeting registration book
- Limit numbers to current DHS prescribed restriction number's
- Update all members as circumstances change

Any person who is unwell should not enter the building. This includes presenting with cold or flu symptoms including fever, runny nose, coughing, sore throat, aches or diarrhea. People with symptoms will be asked to leave.

This plan has been communicated to all affected members of the group.

3.3 Return to facilities

3.3.1 Physical distancing measures

Physical distancing measures mean that people from separate households must be more than 1.5 metres from each other. In addition, a minimum space of 2 metres x 2 metres is required for every person in any room they access.

Spaces (e.g. corridors) where there is a potential for people to come in contact with each other may exist in the building. It is acceptable that people walk past each other in these spaces as the amount of time they are together is minimal. However, they are not to stop in these spaces and, if possible, the movement of members should be managed so that people will not physically brush past each other in this space.

Rooms in the building and the maximum number of people allowed (subject to current restriction limits on total numbers):

Room Name	Size (width X depth)	Max people (width x depth/2)
John Taylor Room		Max 40 people

Signs will be placed into any room where the maximum occupancy is less than the maximum allowed into the entire facility to advise that people are to wait until the room is vacated.

Cleanliness

Cleaning arrangements for the building are to be documented.

On entry to the building it is advised that every person wash their hands with soap and water or carries hand sanitiser to apply at entry. Everyone should avoid touching their faces.

For this building, at the end of every session any equipment and all tables and chairs used by the members need to be cleaned by the meeting organiser using soap and water with washable or disposable cloths. Spray and wipe is also satisfactory for cleaning.

Chairs with soft covers will, where possible, not be used as these are difficult to wipe down.

Council clean as per schedule arranged with the Contracts Management Coordinator at Mitchell Shire Council. This this has been communicated to each building manager.

COVID-19 Infection

If a member is diagnosed with COVID-19, the following process will apply:

- Notify members who may have had contact with the person per DHHS guidance
- Ensure the privacy of the individual is maintained
- Seek assistance from Council contact
- Inform Council to arrange a deep clean of the building

3.6 Breach of the policy

Everyone will be treated with respect and it is expected that members will adhere to guidelines to physical distancing to help minimise the risk of COVID-19 being spread. Should someone test positive who attended a meeting space their privacy will be maintained, however Council will need to support a contact tracing regime to inform others.
