August Meeting Report - Garden visit to Anne & Norman Rose's... By Jeanine Petts

Sunday August 20th dawned as one of those bright sunlit days that make it a joy to be heading outdoors. On arriving at Anne and Norman's home in Kilmore, the stately, colonial house and garden present a charming view from the road. We received a warm welcome from Anne, Norman and Susan who had arrived early, and was helping out with afternoon tea preparations. It wasn't long before more guests arrived, afternoon tea was laid out, and we enjoyed time for a cuppa and chat before wandering the garden. All told (including Anne & Norman) 17 members and friends enjoyed a leisurely garden tour, with plenty of time to socialise and share an array of tasty treats laid on for afternoon tea. There were a few guests we hadn't seen for quite some time,



and it was an absolute pleasure to see and spend time with them.

Norman explained that the house dates back to 1860 and they had the house tenanted and renovated during the last 20 years. Main renovations have taken place during the last 5-6 years, since he and Anne took up full time residence 7 years ago.

The house sits on a double block with views across to the western side of Kilmore, and the garden is of mixed plantings; with a vegetable patch, some exotic plants, and a steadily increasing percentage of native species. Incorporated here and there are some statues and garden art. Tank water collected off the shed provides water for the garden.

One of the main features of the garden are Two Angophora costata Smooth-barked Apple that make a glorious statement view at the front of the house. A Grevillea near the side of the house gets pruned every 2nd year and "does very well". Anne finds they get no flowers if pruning is done every year.

A raised garden bed in the south east corner of the property is full of some lovely native species including:

Another Grevillea that was hit hard by frost 2 years ago and has come back beautifully after some pruning following the frost bite.

Grevillea rosmarinifolia 'Lutea' grows as a medium shrub reaching 1-2m. It bears, narrow, light green leaves and creamy-lemon yellow flowers. A very hardy, free flowering plant that tolerates drought, heavy frost and provides excellent shelter and food for birds.

Telopea speciosissima Waratah was just budding up.

Thryptomene sp.

Correa sp. possibly a C. alba cultivar

Westringia sp.

A fine specimen of *Rhodanthe anthemoides* Chamomile Sunray was growing in a garden bed that runs adjacent to the southern side of house, along with a beautifully fragrant *Boronia megastigma* Brown Boronia. Whilst a range of different Acacia and other native species grow along part of the length of the southern boundary fence-line, one of which, may be *Acacia cultriformis*. A *Eucalyptus nicholii* Narrow-leaved Black Peppermint is growing in the south

western (streetside) corner of the property.

The garden bed on the northern boundary that runs much of the full length of the main driveway, is chock full of native planting including:

Acacia cognata forms a tree or shrub growing from 0.6m to 10m high that has pendulous branches bearing bright green, narrow pyllodes. It is endemic to south eastern Australia and has a number of cultivated forms. A hardy plant most often grown for its foliage that tolerates most frosts and soils provided they have good drainage. Grows in full sun to part shade and can be pruned to shape.

Grevillea rosmarinifolia Rosemary Grevillea is endemic to south eastern Australia in an area ranging from north eastern Victoria into south eastern NSW. Habit and height can be variable ranging from 0.3-2m high. Generally, form is upright with dense foliage, although some plants can be more open. There are a number of selected forms and cultivars, with flower colour ranging from a usual deep pink and cream, through to pink and cream, yellow- green, cream-lemon yellow, red and cream. Leaves are narrow, linear with edges that are rolled under, usually concealing the lower surface. It is a hardy shrub that prefers well-drained soils and tolerates frost, drought, and grows in full sun to part shade. Can be pruned as a hedging plant.

Melaleuca sp.

Callistemon sp.

Hakea sp.

Hakea decurrens Bushy Needle-wood is a particularly spikey species that provides great bird habitat. It forms a shrub to small tree growing to a range of 0.3m to 4m. Cream, sweetly honey scented flowers cover the bush autumn to spring, and, as its name suggests, bears stiff, needle sharp leaves. There are 3 subspecies, 2 of which are endemic to Victoria.

Olearia lepidophylla Club-moss Daisy-bush is endemic to the sandy mallee country of the far north west of Victoria along with some isolated costal occurrences. It is also found in NSW, SA and Tasmania. It grows as a compact or twiggy shrub reaching 0.5m - 1.3m high and is an attractive plant for its interesting small, dark green to silvery, stem clasping leaves. It bears white flowers that have either yellow or mauve to purple centres. Grows in full sun to part shade, in well-drained dry to moist soils, and is drought tolerant and frost hardy.

Westringia fruticosa Coastal Rosemary is endemic to coastal NSW and forms a dense shrub growing up to 1.5-3m high x 3m wide, sometimes wider. It is a very hardy species tolerant of most situations and salt spray that has been widely cultivated and planted for many years with a range of different forms and cultivars now available. It bears grey to dark green leaves held in whorls of 4 around stems and white flowers with orange to purple central spots that can occur year-round. Grows in full sun to light shade in well-drained soil and are often used for

screening or hedging.

Thomasia macrocarpa is a low spreading shrub reaching 0.60m high x 1m high that is endemic to WA and a member of the Lantern Bush family. It bears large, felty grey-green leaves with pink-pale mauve-purple or sometimes white flowers occurring August to November. Naturally found as an understorey shrub in damp soils it grows best in a semi shaded site. It needs protection from hot winds and heavy frosts, but is adaptable to most acidic soil types including sand and clay, and will tolerate some dry periods.

Grevillea 'Fireworks' is a cultivar cross of *Grevillea* 'Pink Pixie' and *Grevillea alpina* by Bywong Nursey NSW. It bears bright red and yellow, terminal flowers from autumn into spring and grows into a small shrub of around 1m x 1m. Suited to a sunny to lightly shaded site in dry to well-drained soil and tolerates light frost.

Allocasuarina sp.

Brachyscome multifida Cut-leaf Daisy is a widespread (including regional), popular, and broadly cultivated species. Forming a low growing, ground cover that reaches 0.30m x 1m. It is a very hardy and adaptable perennial daisy that produces lilac-mauve flowers most of the year. Suitable for a full sun to partial shade site it makes a great border plant. Annual pruning promotes better flowering, and it strikes very readily from cuttings.

Outside the front fence, growing near the letter box *Grevillea preissii* subsp. *preissii* popped with its bright red flowers. It is one of 2 *G. preissii* subspecies that are endemic to the south west of WA and bears ornamental greyish green to green foliage contrasting with bright red flowers. It forms a low shrub growing 0.2-1.7m high x 1-2m wide with a dense spreading habit. Flowering occurs from winter to spring and it is best grown in a warm, sunny to semi-shaded position in well drained soil.

Other native tree species in the garden are:

Eucalyptus polyanthemos Red Box is endemic to eastern Australia in Victoria and NSW. There are 4 subspecies, 3 of which are found in Victoria. It can grow as a tall tree 20-40m high or as a mallee. It bears rough, fibrous bark on the trunk and larger branches with smooth greyish to cream-coloured bark above, or smooth bark throughout. Juvenile leaves are eggshaped to round, with lance-shape to egg-shaped or almost round adult leaves.

Eucalyptus spathulata Swamp Mallet is endemic to WA, grows 8-12m tall and does not form a lignotuber. Bark is usually smooth, satiny and seasonally ranges in colour from green-grey to copper-orange. Adult leaves are shiny, dark metallic bluegreen to green.

Eucalyptus leucoxylon Yellow Gum has five recognised subspecies with varying ranges occurring in SA, NSW and

Victoria. Depending on subspecies, height can range from 4-12m tall. Bark can be variable, usually smooth and yellowish, sometimes with rough bark at the base. Adult leaves are green to blue-green and lance shaped to curved.

Anne and Norman have had professionals in to assist maintaining the garden; arborists to manage trees for safety etc., and regularly employ and highly recommend Jasper from Garden and Property Maintenance (Ph: 0467 648 793) for general gardening help.

Our afternoon was completed with a second cuppa and afternoon tea, during which, Norbert formally thanked Anne and Norman for their gracious hospitality, presenting them with a gift of garden tools by way of appreciation.

Again, I would like to thank Anne and Norman for their warm and most refined hospitality, kindness, generosity and support of APS Mitchell Group.
